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President's Message

I'm writing this before the end of October because I'll be gone from Oct 28 until Nov 15. Our CWA students will have graduated by the time you read this, and I hope several

of them will be active on November 11/12 in the slower-speed CWTs. Three times per year (March, June and November) we celebrate our graduating students by holding a slower-speed CWT (maximum speed of 20 wpm). This gives our Levels 1, 2 and 3 graduates a good shot at working lots of us. You'll know who they are because they'll be sending their names and "CWA" instead of a number or state/province. 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I'm thrilled to say that I once again have two radios that can look at more than two antennas. I recently climbed up the tower with repaired antenna switch in hand, remounted it on the mast, hooked up the control cable and all the coax feed lines, and after some false starts and stops, I'm back to having true multiband capability again. My recent CWT scores show it, too \odot .

We're getting close to year's end and I'm happy to report that the club is doing really well. Our signature service – CW Academy – continues to receive accolades from many different sources – students, blogs, magazine articles, and emails. [Rob did not yet know about the FOC honor when he wrote this column, but he was a central player in it! – Ed.] We had another successful CW Open – our fourth – and our QTX activity continues to rise.

The weekly CWTs are also particularly noteworthy. For example, in recent radio sport outings, after several hours of operation in once-per-year events, I found that my per-hour rates were glacial and I had to stop because I had run out of QSO opportunities. Yet, week after week, session after session, I work far more QSOs in 60 minutes.

This year, Will WJ9B has made every CWT session. And many others have missed only a very few. There is something addicting about CWTs. The adrenaline rush is profound and it is so nice to work many of the same people, week after week, multiple times per day. While I'm out of the country for 16 days, I will miss nine CWT sessions. It will feel strange on those three Wednesdays not to wake up early and stumble around trying to gain consciousness in time for the 1300Z session. Whenever my travels interrupt my CWT participation, I find that I really appreciate it when I return and resume.

The weather here in Santa Cruz is still quite warm but darkness falls much earlier than during the Summer. Some parts of the state have had big rain storms but here we are still counting the drops. Perhaps while I'm gone we'll get some needed moisture. I'm looking forward to the rain but not the wind. As I write this, Mexico is hours away from landfall by a 200 mph hurricane. That's the largest storm to hit the Western hemisphere. Here, when the wind exceeds 25 mph I lower the crank-up tower to reduce the risk of antenna damage. A 200 mph storm would probably strip all the aluminum off the mast. To our members in Mexico, I hope you fare well.

My last day of radio before heading out will be Tuesday night (October 27). I'm hoping to meet some of our members (4X6GP and 4Z1UF) during my journey. But I won't have a chance to be 4X/K6RB this time out. So my CW withdrawal symptoms will be glaring by the time I get back.

November is a busy month here in the U.S., with at least three major contest weekends and our Thanksgiving holiday. Your Editor is compounding his hectic schedule with separate trips from California to Chicago and Boston, putting some finishing touches on this issue of *Solid Copy* at 37,000 feet. "Back

at the ranch," I rebuilt the antenna switching logic at N6XI Truckee. This mid-range contest station is capable of SO2R, Multi-Single, limited Multi-Two, and SO2V-Remote operation. The new arrangement eliminates most of the antenna selection steering diodes, simplifying the matrix that sits between the band decoders and the antenna relays and offering additional, precious millivolts to some rather finicky relays. There is still work to do (Isn't there always?) but it is much more reliable than before and incrementally easier to maintain. Onward.

Like many in the U.S., I try to count my blessings during the Thanksgiving season. In addition to health, happiness, family, and an active retirement, I include my association with CWops and its many outstanding members. We received gratifying validation of our collective pride in jobs well done from another CW club this month, FOC. See the <u>article below</u> for details.

I've always felt somewhat chauvinistic about our amateur radio fraternity, that we are a cut above the masses in intelligence, motivation, attitude, and other positive attributes. And I've always felt that CW operators are a similar cut above the rest of ham radio. Let's all hold our breath and look forward to hearing "CU on 60" some time in the future.

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The CWops Award for Advancing the Art of CW

The purpose of this yearly award is to recognize individuals, groups, or organizations that have made the greatest contribution(s) toward advancing the art or practice of radio communications by Morse code.

<u>Criteria</u> - Candidates for the award may be one or more of the following:

- Authors of publications related to CW
- CW recruiters, trainers, mentors, coaches and instructors
- Public advocates of CW
- Organizers of CW activities
- Designers and inventors who advance the art or practice of CW
- Other contributors to the art or practice of CW

Note: The award is *not* limited to amateur radio operators and organizations.

Nomination

Nominations may be made by anybody (not limited to CWops members). Nominations should be emailed to awards@cwops.org with a CC to secretary@cwops.org. In order to be considered, a nomination must be received by January 31, 2016 and include:

- Name(s) and call sign(s) (if applicable) of nominee(s), and complete contact information including their postal address(es), email address(es), and telephone number(s).
- A detailed explanation supporting nominee qualifications according to the above criteria.
- Complete contact information for the person submitting the nomination.

Presentation of Award

A plaque will be presented at a major amateur radio venue (Dayton Hamvention, Visalia, etc.). If the recipient(s) is/are not present, it will be sent to them.

Fred K6DGW: After 38 years on the Auburn "farm," Andrea and I sold it to one of our kids and bought a single-story, fairly new home in Sparks, NV, close [but not too close :-)] to another of our kids and his family. It's a gated community, the gate is annoying, and we are in an HOA, but we really like it.

That said, the HOA is quite benign and benevolent, and while I won't be seeking permission for a 70' self-supporting crank-up, I will install a flagpole in the back yard with an insulator at the bottom next spring.

In the meantime, I joined the Comstock Memorial Station crew (W7RN) and, thanks to a lot of help and especially from Rick N6XI, I have the remote from my K3 to Tom's K3 working. Managed one CWT last Wednesday, old school manual sending. Rick gave me the recipe for N1MM+ on the remote and I'll be working on that next.

So I was QRT for only about 2 months, not too shabby.

Gary N5PHT: Since we do a lot of RV'ing I have been experimenting with antennas for 80 meters that I can use during the CWT events. I am currently trying an Inverted L and that seems to be doing much better than the Hamstick I was using.

I am happy with my 40-10 meter version G5RV for the other bands. Hope to be in West Texas for 11 Nov CWT at one of the few "dark zone" rated campgrounds in the USA (Cooper Breaks State Park) and then in Oklahoma at a National Wildlife Refuge near Lawton for the 18 Nov CWT.

While at the Wildlife Refuge I hope to do a SOTA from Mt. Scott. Hope to CU from those places.

Jerry AC4BT: The antenna that I've been using for the last three years on 30 meters is a horizontal dipole up 65 feet supported by two trees. It has performed great over that time and I was able to work and confirm DXCC on 30 meters without much difficulty. If I heard them I worked them.

Well, several weeks ago the support came down on one of the trees but I found it wasn't disastrous as the top of the antenna and feed line were still up at 65 feet and only the support keeping the antenna horizontal came down. My intent was to repair it when I had some time but until then I tied the loose end down to a tree at a 90 degree angle in a sloper configuration.

I then got on the radio that evening and was wondering who the stateside station was pretending to be a DX station from Egypt. He was coming in 20 over 9, way too strong of a signal. I had put the radio into Split operations and could weakly hear the rest of the pile-up. Even so I decided to call the station 1 up, where the rest of the pile-up was. The Egyptian station immediately picked me up and stopped to ask what I was using for an antenna and that I had the strongest US signal that day. I guess I won't be 'repairing' this antenna anytime soon!

<u>Marv N5AW</u>: Although he did not report it himself, Marv N5AW (#1941) set a new U.S SOAB CQ WPX CW low-power record with 6.3 Meg and 989 prefixes! If you think of it, congratulate Marv next time you talk to him on the air.

Rich VE3KI: Another shy guy, apparently, Rich VE3KI mentioned offline that he broke 1000 QSOs in SS CW for the first time. Congratulations, Rich!

We have just concluded the September-October semester of CW Academy (CWA). Student signups to our popular and unique service for teaching CW continue to roll in at a record pace. We have had approximately 800 new signups since the beginning of this year and are on pace for 1,000+ signups for the calendar year.

Our CW Academy program continues to grow. Many aspiring CW operators sign up for our programs after hearing the positive results and success stories that others have experienced using our proven methods. Our eight week, Internet-based, classroom instruction for Level 1, Level 2, and Level 3 courses meets twice a week and offers an opportunity to work with some of the most accomplished CW operators serving as advisors.

"...Wow... taking the CW Ops Level 1 class with Andy Barkley (WB7DKZ, CWA advisor, not yet a member) and am having a great time... not really re-learning code, just learning to get my CW speed up from a muddy 10 wpm to about 15-18 right now, and we're only into the 3rd week of class. I'd say it's going great, and Andy is a great Elmer. "

Here are a couple of comments from two of Bill's (KC4D) Level 2 students:

- "...To my CW advisor Bill KC4D.... I just want to reach out and thank you for the excellent CWA Level II class. I never stop learning things with ham radio and you have raised the bar on my CW learning. The class was a pleasure. I looked forward to each meeting. The practice was great. I've upped my confidence and my speed, and have begun some head-copy. You wildly exceeded my expectations."
- "...Well, I don't think that it could have gone any better than to have Bill as our adviser. I really looked forward to meeting with Bill and the other students on our assigned days over the two month period that we met. Bill was extremely patient, willing to praise successes and willing to offer constructive criticisms and advice when necessary. I think that last part was critical I needed to hear, "Joe, that part was good, but you need to work on spacing between words." We heard that a lot and I'm trying hard to work on that. Thank you so much for offering this wonderful program. I will be promoting it to other people. Whoever is lucky enough to get Bill as an adviser in the future will be in very capable hands. I'm not a fan of the term 'Elmer,' but he truly fits the definition. Yes, the program is a challenge but I found it to be very rewarding. I hope CW Academy continues to produce many, many more CW operators."

On November 11, to celebrate the graduation of the class of September-October, 2015, CWops will hold its traditional "slower" CWTs. Everything is the same, just a bit slower. Keep your speeds at 20 wpm or less, and take the time to congratulate the graduates who participate. You'll know who they are because they'll be sending "name" and "CWA."

As always, with an unrelenting flow of incoming applications, CW Academy needs more volunteer advisors, especially DX advisors. All CWops members are invited (and encouraged!) to give something back to our great hobby and serve as an advisor. It's not a huge time commitment, classes are held two times a week for an eight week period when the semester is underway. We have three semesters a year – Jan/Feb, Apr/May, and Sep/Oct. We offer advisor training and provide the curriculum materials that are utilized in our courses. Please help us out so that we can continue to provide this unique service to the many aspiring CW operators out there who are looking to improve their CW skills with the CW Academy.

Jack W0UCE, with his Associate Advisor (AA) program, continues to do a wonderful job of bringing associate advisors on-board, training them and having them assist other advisors in the classes. Many of our AA's began as Jack's students, became AA's under Jack's tutelage, and then transitioned to become full time advisors running their own classes after one or two semesters. The student becomes the teacher!

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CW Academy Receives Al Slater Award from FOC!

One of our sister CW organizations, perhaps the oldest CW organization in the world, is the *First Class Operators' Club (FOC)*. Although chartered in and operated from the United Kingdom, FOC is, like CWops, an international club, with about two thirds of its membership outside the UK. Many hams belong to both FOC and CWops. Each year at its annual gathering, FOC presents the Al Slater Award to a worthy individual or organization. I quote here from a recent email:

"In memory of Al Slater G3FXB who become a Silent Key on 11th November 1992, this award is presented once a year to an individual, group or society that has, in the judgment of the Committee, made an outstanding contribution to the hobby that reflects the attitudes and approach of Al Slater. This came from exemplary and considerate operating standards and a high level of encouragement, friendship and support given to other amateurs, especially newcomers.

"This therefore is FOC's most prestigious award, and held in high regard throughout amateur radio. It is presented only to truly outstanding and wholly deserving recipients. Previous awards have been made to N4AR, CDXC, K3ZO, NCDXF, ZL3GQ, PA0LOU, G3SXW, W3LPL, G4BUE, K1ZZ, G3MXJ/F5VHY, FISTS, G4BUO, EI5DI, G3XTT, G3RJV, G3BJ, G3PJT and G7VJR/ClubLog. All have been great contributors to our marvelous hobby. [Many of these prior recipients are members of both FOC and CWops. – Ed.]

"This year, exceptionally, the award will be presented not to one but to two recipients. FOC Committee found them equally deserving in their different ways. They both fully reflect the aims as just quoted - one to an individual and one to a 'group or society."

[The individual recipient was Bob Allphin K4UEE, an outstanding operator and DXpeditioner.]

"CW Academy

"The Al Slater Award is also being presented to the 'CW Academy.'

"The CWA was created about four years ago. Its mission is to increase the number of competent CW operators on the air. CWA works with all levels of students, from those who want to learn CW for the first time to old timers who want to increase their speed. Students receive all class material free of charge and all of their instructors are volunteers.

"About 600 hams have taken CW Academy courses, many of them progressing through all three skill levels so that they are now able to send and 'head copy' at 25 words per minute, or better.

"A driving force behind the CW Academy is Rob K6RB (FOC 1821) [CWops 3 – Ed.]. Other FOC members are among its instructors.

"This unique educational effort, aimed at ensuring that CW will remain a vibrant mode on the ham bands, is a worthy recipient of this award." Wow! We're all proud of CW Academy, but to receive this recognition from FOC is a huge, unexpected, and much appreciated honor. Congratulations to Rob K6RB, Will WJ9B, Jerry AC4BT, and the dozens of other CWops volunteers who make it happen. And thanks to the FOC and its managing Committee for the very kind words.

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CWops Tests

Well, we seem to have come through the change from daylight savings time to standard time (in the northern hemisphere, that is) without a hitch. Did anyone forget and show up an hour too late? Participation on November 4/5 seemed to be in the normal range, considering the disturbed propagation conditions. At least, at my latitude they were certainly disturbed – there was lots of flutter on signals into northern Europe.

We are heading into the busiest part of the CW contesting season. By the time you read this, the ARRL CW Sweepstakes (for those of us in W/VE) will be over. The special slow-speed CWTs on November 11-12 in honor of the CWA graduation will also be over by the time this appears. The biggest world-wide contest of the year, CQ WW CW, will be on November 28-29, followed by the ARRL 160, ARRL 10 and RAC Winter contests on successive weekends, and the Stew Perry Topband Challenge on December 26-27, not to mention a number of other (dare I call them smaller?) contests. In between, for those who can't get enough, as well as for those who prefer not to dedicate entire weekends to contesting, we'll have our regular CWTs. Hmm, when am I going to find the time to put a 160m antenna back up for the 160m contests?

As of November 1 we were just about 5/6ths of the way through the year's CWT sessions. We now have eight members who have already qualified for the gold medal, 39 more who have reached the silver medal level, and another 41 who have qualified for bronze. With 27 more CWT sessions yet to come (well, a bit fewer by the time you read this), there will probably be 15-20 more to add to the list, and many of those who have already qualified for silver or bronze will move up to the next higher level. These numbers are a bit down from last year, but considering how much the qualifying levels were raised (doubled in North America, increased by 50% in Europe), that's hardly surprising.

The number of people reporting CWT scores at 3830scores.com continues to increase. It seems to me that quite a few people who started out posting scores as non-members have become new members later in the year, so the CWTs appear to be doing their bit to attract new members. Let's continue to make them a welcoming experience for new call signs that show up.

We do the CWTs because they're fun, so let's all make sure they continue to be fun for everyone.

Two of the really fun ARRL-sponsored single band contests are set for the the first part of December. The 160 Meter event has long been a favorite of the "top band gang" and is a real test of gear and propagation. The 10 Meter contest can be either a blast or a dud ... just depends on the "ions." With the sunspot cycle pretty much "over-the-hill," this year may herald a long term downswing in conditions. Check the propagation gurus and throw some "fu-fu dust" up towards old
